

SAT Reading Checklist

Getting Started:

- Subscribe to the NY Times daily headlines newsletter (http://www.nytimes.com/marketing/todaysheadlines/)
- Begin a habit of reading a news article every day
- Keep a notebook to answer questions about each article (see questions below)
- Make flashcards for each word you don't know

Reading Actively:

- Write a paragraph or more answering AT LEAST one of the questions below for each article you read
- Use evidence from the article to support your answers
 - 1. What is the main idea of the article?
 - 2. What are the most important facts from the article?
 - Practice distinguishing fact from opinion
 - 3. What inferences can be drawn from the article?
 - Remember that inferences must be based on information in the article
 - A valid inference is a statement that is implied by the given information
 - An inference is a logical extension of facts and/or opinions that goes beyond what is explicitly stated, but does so logically
 - 4. How is the article organized?
 - Determine how the first paragraph relates to the article as a whole
 - Determine an outline the author may have used to write the article
 - 5. What is the tone of the article?
 - Describe the author's mood or attitude
 - Identify the writing style and purpose:
 - Narrative
 - Persuasive
 - Factual

Making Flashcards:

- Are there any vocab words you don't know?
 - Guess the meaning from context clues before looking up the definition
 - Make a flashcard for each word with the following:
 - A dictionary definition
 - A sentence of your own creation containing the word
 - A drawing (optional)
